## Gov. Sarah Sanders appoints Cory Cox as Special Justice of the Supreme Court of Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., August 19, 2026— Governor Sarah Huckabee Sanders announced that Cory Cox will serve as a Special Justice of the Supreme Court of Arkansas, replacing Justice Barbara W. Webb, who Chief Justice Karen Baker has certified is temporarily unable to serve in her role as a Justice on the Supreme Court of Arkansas. Cox’s appointment will conclude on December 31, 2026, or upon the return of Justice Webb, whichever comes first.

“Cory is a highly accomplished attorney, has decades of government experience, and is a dedicated public servant. As we pray for Justice Webb’s recovery, I know Cory has the character and work ethic to serve on the Court and uphold our Constitution. I’m deeply grateful for his service in this role,” said Governor Sanders.

“I’m deeply honored that Governor Sanders has trusted me to serve in this capacity. I pray that Justice Webb makes a full and speedy recovery. Until that time, I look forward to working with the Court’s other justices to uphold Arkansas law and protect and defend the rights of Arkansas citizens,” said Cory Cox.

Cory Cox has served as a special justice on the Supreme Court of Arkansas on a variety of past cases and currently works as the founder of Cory Cox Consulting. Cox began his career as Assistant Legal Counsel and Deputy Legal Counsel in the Office of Governor Mike Huckabee, focusing on criminal justice issues. His later service in state government included work at the Arkansas Insurance Department, the Office of the Commissioner of State Lands, the Arkansas Department of Human Services, and as Legislative Director and Chief of Staff in the office of the Arkansas Attorney General.

Cox graduated with a Bachelor

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of Arts in History and Political Science from Arkansas Tech University, and earned his Juris Doctor from the University of Arkansas – Little Rock, William H. Bowen School of Law.

He has served on a variety of boards and task forces during his time in public service, including on the Arkansas Sentencing Commission, the Arkansas Criminal Code Revision Commission, the Arkansas Crime Victims Reparations Board, and as an elected School Board Member of the Perryville School District. Cox resides in Perryville with his family.

## Brzoska vs. Meta: The fight over fake ads

Fake ads using the image of Rafal Brzoska, founder and CEO of InPost, have once again appeared on Facebook. This time, scammers used his image in a video suggesting that he had been detained by the police. It is the latest episode in a dispute with Meta that has now been running for two years.

Brzoska reacted sharply. He publicly named people responsible for Meta’s operations in Poland and accused the company of failing to stop fraudulent ads despite repeated complaints, legal action and extensive media coverage. Shortly afterwards, his Instagram account was temporarily blocked.

Meta said that publicly naming employees and directing criticism at them could put their safety at risk. Brzoska argued that the company was focusing on his language rather than the real problem: ads using someone else’s identity to defraud Facebook users can still be bought and distributed through its system. The conflict began in 2024, when fake ads featuring Brzoska and his wife started appearing on

Facebook and Instagram. Some of them used deepfake technology to promote fraudulent investment schemes.

The case soon went beyond complaints filed directly with Meta. In August 2024, Poland’s Personal Data Protection Office (UODO) ordered Meta Platforms Ireland to stop displaying in Poland ads using Brzoska’s personal data and image

The emergency measure was imposed for three months, the maximum period allowed under the GDPR procedure used by the regulator. UODO argued that the ads could damage Brzoska’s reputation and expose users to financial losses. Meta challenged the order in court, but the Warsaw Administrative Court refused to suspend it. In March 2025, Meta eventually withdrew its complaints, and the proceedings were discontinued. A separate civil case brought by

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## Four Mark Luttrell Transition Center (MLTC) inmates inducted in National Honor Society

MEMPHIS, Tenn. – For the first time in the facility’s history, ten inmates at the Mark Luttrell Transition Center (MLTC) have been inducted into a national honor society. The incarcerated men are working toward associate degrees in business through Southwest Tennessee Community College.

The inmates joined Southwest’s chapter of the National Society of Leadership and Success (NSLS) during a ceremony at the facility. Southwest faculty who travel to MLTC to teach college courses in person presented each student with a certificate and a medal.

Students with a cumulative GPA

of 2.75 or higher are eligible to join the NSLS, which recognizes academic achievement and helps members build leadership skills. Southwest established its chapter in 2020, and more than 800 students have joined since then.

“This recognition was earned,” said Christa Jenkins, TDOC Post-Secondary Education Coordinator. “These inmates met the academic standard and put in the work required of college students. They are building an education now that can help them when they return to their communities.”

TDOC partners with colleges and universities across Tennessee to offer post-secondary education opportunities, including vocational certificates and associate, bachelor’s, and master’s degrees. The programs give inmates skills they can use after release, supporting successful reentry and reducing recidivism.

securing incredible wins for the American people.

Under the last administration, cartel profits soared as criminal organizations exploited our open border to ramp up their trafficking operations. Thanks to President Trump’s strong border enforcement, human-smuggling related transactions fell 62 percent in 2025 compared with the year before, the Treasury Department announced last week. In July, the Department of Homeland Security recorded its 15th straight month of zero illegal aliens released into our country, while border apprehensions were down 96 percent from their peak

under Biden.

With the border secure, the administration has focused on apprehending criminal illegal aliens and removing them from our country. This month, an ICE investigation led to the sentencing of a criminal illegal alien from Colombia who stole the identity of a U.S. citizen to gain residency in our country for more than 20 years and vote in multiple elections. The agency also lodged an immigration detainer against a 47-year-old illegal alien from Mexico who committed a hit-and-run against multiple pedestrians in downtown Nashville, leaving two victims in wheelchairs. The U.S.

Attorney’s Office for the Middle District of Tennessee, meanwhile, recently filed an opening brief in its fight to reinstate human smuggling charges against Kilmar Abrego Garcia, the criminal illegal alien Democrats championed as a hero after the administration moved to deport him last year.

As of May, the administration had deported close to 900,000 illegal aliens, while 2.2 million chose to leave our country rather than face deportation proceedings. This effort is especially important as our country continues to deal with the consequences of Biden’s open border. Just last week, police in northern Virginia arrested a Salvadoran illegal alien—who was released into our country by the Biden administration in April 2024—for stabbing and murdering a 42-year-old mother on a jogging trail near her home.

The American people want such violent criminals removed from our country. Yet Democrats are continuing to put illegal aliens

ahead of American citizens. According to a new report, Democrat legislators across 32 states have introduced more than 240 bills supporting illegal aliens. Among the measures: prohibiting federal law enforcement from wearing masks and protecting themselves from doxxing, banning ICE officers from government property, and preventing the administration from opening new detention facilities.

The reason is simple: Democrats want to abolish ICE. They don’t believe in immigration enforcement. In fact, they don’t believe we should have a border at all. If given the opportunity, they would roll back all of President Trump’s progress and take our country back to the Biden years that saw millions of illegal aliens pouring across our border.

The good news: Republicans are in charge—and there is nothing that will stop us from keeping our border secure, deporting criminals, and enforcing the rule of law.
