Officially launched in 2016, the initiative allows players to use their platforms, both on and off the field, to bring important causes to the forefront. This season, almost half of the participating players, coaches and team staff have chosen to support various forms of cancer and other physical health-related causes, such as raising awareness of neurodegenerative disorders and promoting preventive services for conditions like diabetes. Participants have also identified a number of other important causes to support, including pro-



moting mental health services in underserved communities, empowering youth, advancing various women's health initiatives, supporting social justice and Every year, players across the league have the opportunity to share the off-field causes that matter most to them during My Cause My Cleats,' said NFL Senior Vice President of Social Responsibility Anna Isaacson. "These important causes, ranging from youth and education to health and wellness, help strengthen our communities, and the league is grateful for out players' continued support of this important initiative."

To bring their designs to life and showcase their causes in a unique way, players collaborate with cleat manufacturers and designers each season to create these custom-designed cleats. NFL teams without a home game during Week 13 may also wear cleats during Week 13 away games or at home during Week

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"We are thrilled to once again provide players, coaches and team staff the platform to showcase causes that are meaningful to them on the field through My Cause My Cleats," said NFL Senior Vice President of Player Operations Tracy Perlman. "The record levels of participation in this season's initiative underscore the collective commitment across the league to making a positive difference in our communities."

My Cause My Cleats initiative during the Thanksgiving NFL games with promotional efforts including a marketing spot featuring the many causes that NFL players have chosen to support. The 90-second spot features Alec Ingold of the Miami Dolphins, Aaron Jones of the Green Bay Packers and DeAndre Hopkins of the Tennessee Titans. Ingold will bring attention to the important work of Child Net in connecting vulnerable youth in South Florida to critical resources, including foster care and adoption services. Jones will highlight his organization, the A&A All The Way Foundation, and its efforts to positively impact the lives of our nation's youth. Additionally, Hopkins will promote the essential work of the non-profit S.M.O.O.O.T.H., which empowers women affected by the perils of domestic violence.

Following Week 13 games, select players will donate their cleats by auctioning them on NFL Auction. The NFL does not profit from the sale of these cleats. All funds raised will be donated by the NFL Foundation to each player's selected charity. Fans may bid on these cleats at NFL.com/Auction throughout

2023 NFL Thanksgiving Day games set viewership record across all three big games

NEW YORK — Nov. 28, 2023 - For the second consecutive year, the NFL has set a Thanksgiving Day viewership record.

The average viewership (TV+Digital) across all three games - Green Bay Packers versus Detroit Lions, Washington Commanders versus Dallas Cowboys and San Francisco 49ers versus Seattle Seahawks was 34.1 million, the highest Thanksgiving Day average on record and surpassing the previous record of 33.6 million last

The total unduplicated audience across all three games was 133 million, the second-highest Thanksgiving Day total audience on record behind only last year. The late afternoon game on CBS between the Commanders and Cowboys averaged 41.8 million most-watched NFL regular season game on record behind only last year's Thanksgiving Day game between the Cowboys and New York Giants. The early game on FOX be-
