Silverfield and Henigan earn Sports Writers Assoc. honors... from sports 1

Silverfield guided the Tigers to a 10-3 season in 2023, including a 36-26 win in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl over Iowa State. The 10-win season is just the fifth in program history, and his four bowl victories are the most in school history. His 31 victories are the second-most in program history for a head coach in his

first four seasons, while those wins rank in a tie for fourth nationally among head coaches hired in 2020.

The Tigers had nine student-athletes earn All-AAC honors in 2023, the most for the team since 2019. Running back Blake Watson and linebacker Chandler Martin earned first-team acco-

lades, while wide receiver Roc Taylor, offensive lineman Xavier Hill, Henigan and defensive lineman Jaylon Allen were named to the second team. Offensive lineman Jacob Likes and defensive back Simeon Blair earned spots on the third team, while linebacker Geoffrey Cantin-Arku earned honorable-mention.

In 2023, Henigan earned Sec-

ond-Team All-AAC honors after completing 318-of-476 passes for 3,883 yards and 32 touchdowns. He also rushed for five scores on the season. Henigan set the program's single-season marks for completions and attempts and tied the completion percentage record (.668).

He was named MVP of the AutoZone Liberty Bowl after totaling five touchdowns (4 passing, 1 rushing), helping the Tigers earn a 36-26 victory over Iowa State for the team's fourthconsecutive bowl title. Also this season, Henigan became the program's career leader in completions (838) and passing yards (10,773).

last quarter of 2023 compared to 2022.

The major property crime rate is determined by the number of reported vehicle thefts, burglaries, and other felony thefts. During the last quarter of 2023, the major property crime rate declined 10.1 percent compared to the last quarter of 2022. The decline was driven by a significant 16.4 percent drop in Memphis and 16.0 percent decline countywide in the vehicle theft rate and a 10.3 percent in Memphis and 11.2 percent decline countywide in the rate for other felony theft offenses (which includes many thefts from vehicles).

For the entire year, the major property crime rate still increased by 17.4 percent in Memphis and 15.8 percent for the entire county compared to 2022 due to a 27.8 percent increase in Memphis and 26.0 percent countywide increase during the first three quarters,

driven by over 15,000 reported mined by 54 specific types of revehicle thefts stolen during that three-quarter period.

"Things turned around during the latter part of the year, with law enforcement being very proactive in meeting the challenge of vehicle thefts and breakins. The Memphis Police Department has given out close to 10,000 steering wheel locks at no cost to residents. A special auto theft task force has focused on apprehending offenders, as have uniform patrol officers, averaging four vehicle theft arrests per day in 2023. And law enforcement worked to increase visibility during the holiday shopping season. Together, all of this paid off in terms of a reduction in vehicle thefts and thefts from vehicles," said Bill Gibbons, executive director of the Public Safety Institute and president of the Crime Commission.

The overall crime rate is deter-

ported crimes tracked by the TBI (called Group A crimes). While the overall crime rate was up 7.2 percent in Memphis and 6.0 percent countywide for the entire year compared to 2022, the rate declined 6.4 percent in Memphis and 7.2 percent throughout the county during the last quarter of 2023 compared to the last quarter of 2022.

The major violent crime rate remained fairly steady for the entire year, with a 7.4 percent increase in Memphis and a 6.3 percent increase countywide for the year compared to 2022. This increase was driven primarily by an increase in the robbery rate of about 20 percent.

A category of crime that was up for the year compared to 2022 and up even more so during the last quarter of the year was the rate of reported domestic violence offenses – up 3.6 percent for the year in Memphis and 3.0 percent countywide over 2022 but up a disturbing 8.4 percent in

Memphis and 8.3 percent in all of Shelby County during the last quarter of the year.
